Catechesis VII: Church History



Catechesis VII Purpose:

The purpose of this course is to present the history of the Catholic Church from the first century to the present day. In this course, special attention will be given to: the nature and mission of the Church; the guiding work of the Holy Spirit; the lives and stories of the saints who furthered the Church's mission; the institution of the sacraments and the development of the liturgy; the structure and hierarchy of the Church; and the impact of the ecumenical councils.

Included will be an analysis of the Church's response to challenges such as persecution, heresy, scandal, and the times when individuals in the Church have failed in their mission to spread the Good News of Christ's Kingdom.

- 2. What is heresy?
- 3. What doctrines did Gnostics, Marcionists, Manichaeists, Montanists, and Docetists deny?
- 4. What is the nature and function of an Ecumenical Council?
- 5. What is the Nicene Creed?
- 6. What were the causes of the Great Schism of 1054?
- 7. How is Christian monasticism unique?
- 8. Why were the Crusades reasonable given the historical circumstances?
- 9. What was the origin and nature of the Inquisition?
- 10. What was Luther's attitude toward the Sacraments?
- 11. What were the 4 major contributing factors to the Protestant Reformation?

Catechesis VII Challenge Questions:

"This element is designed to give catechetical instruction for high-school aged young people an apologetical component. Publishers and teachers or catechists are to strive to provide for a catechetical instruction and formation that is imbued with an apologetical approach. Challenges that appear under one particular theme can also apply to other themes in the framework, and such application is encouraged." Introduction to the Bishops' Framework.

Answers to each of the following questions with references to the Catechism are found in the last section of each course in the Framework. It should be noted, however, that each question has also been addressed within the coursework of the standards.

- A. Don't the failings, errors, and sins of the members of the Church nullify its sanctity?
- B. Wasn't it hypocritical for the Catholic Church to propose to follow Jesus, and yet participate in the Crusades?
- C. Isn't the Inquisition proof that the Catholic Church is intolerant of modern thought, science, and freedom?
- D. Does the Galileo case not prove that the Catholic Church is anti-science, holds to outdated teachings, and is not infallible?
- E. Why should we believe the Catholic Church is the Church Christ began, when there is corruption within the Church, as evidenced by the selling of indulgences during the Middle Ages?
